GIRLS CAREER INSTITUTE OUR DELEGATES SHARE EXPERIENCES MJ Palmer, First Vice-President



Many of the programs/projects we feature at our monthly meetings highlight a particular "cause" which our members support. One of the causes we have been involved with for many years, and which is especially meaningful to our women's organization, is the sponsorship of young ladies in our community to attend the annual Girls' Career Institute (GCI). Val Seufert, who is the VTWC lead in selecting our GCI delegates, had this to say about GCI: "This is a project that really helps girls feel much better making the decision to go away to college or not. There is so much anxiety for students getting ready for the next chapter in life that, if we can relieve it a little, it is so worthwhile. They also meet so many wonderful people there and many become lifelong friends."

GCI offers a "mini college and career exploration experience" at Douglass Residential College on the campus of Rutgers University. Delegates experience a sample of college life by living in a dorm, eating in a cafeteria and attending lectures and workshops. They learn about career choices from volunteer professional speakers and how to network with other delegates from all over the State of New Jersey.

During our September meeting, the young ladies we sponsored for GCI this year, Ashley Gallego Giraldo and Alexandra Monson, will share their experiences from the event. So, have your questions ready.

MESSAGE FROM THE VTWC EXECUTIVE BOARD by MJ PALMER



The VTWC Executive Board met on August 21 to plan for the Fall projects and discuss some concerns voiced by members.

You might have noticed for the June meeting an abundance of requests for in-kind donations. The Board would like to minimize these requests, or eliminate them all together, when there is money in budgets to cover the cost of these donations. This has been previously communicated at our meetings. Committee leaders should consider this a gentle reminder.

When there is no longer any money left in budgets, committee leaders are asked to coordinate with other leads when asking for in-kind donations. This way our generous members will not feel over-solicited when donating in-kind. If you are a member who wants to bring in-kind donations to every meeting, please contact committee leaders about what is urgently needed that month or for any upcoming special needs such as during holidays.

One of the other concerns the Board discussed was a better way to distribute sign-up requests. This was another situation that arose in June with the soldier stockings. There was a lot of confusion over what was still needed. This resulted in many emails and a lot of extra donations which will, gratefully, be put to other use.

Those of us on the Board, who have been involved in projects where volunteers are needed to sign up for helping or for donating items, feel the hard copy sign-up sheets circulated at meetings are the best method to use. We are exploring an online process with a document that can easily be accessed by members and not at risk of corruption by members who are not as fluid with Signup Genius or Google Docs. If you do not attend meetings, but need volunteers or donations, please ask a fellow member who attends meetings to circulate and collect the hard copy sign-up sheets.

If you are challenged by signing up for any event, feel free to directly reach out to the committee lead for that event rather than "reply all' to email.



Chemo & Dialysis 28 wide by 45 long (maximum 30 wide by 50 long)

DASI 36 wide by 60 long (for beds)

Lap Robes 26 wide by 26 long

Baby Blankets 29 wide by 29 long

Rectangles 7 inches by 9 inches

Since I haven't delivered any blankets to the Karen Ann Quinlan Hospice yet this calendar year, I am hoping to get a few more together before I make a trip there.
